Paul Helm & Gerald Bray

We are delighted to announce that Professor Paul Helm and Dr Gerald Bray have just joined the staff of the Highland Theological College in a part-time capacity.

It is due to the generosity of UHI, which is keen to develop the research side of our developing university, that we have been enabled to make these appointments.

Professor Helm and Dr Bray are both well known scholars in the Reformed tradition with many publications to their names. Professor Helm is a philosopher who formerly taught at King's College, London and at Regents College, Vancouver. Dr Bray taught at Oakhill Theological College in London and more recently at Beeson Divinity School in Birmingham, Alabama. He is currently Director of Research for the Latimer Trust.

These fine scholars will each supervise three or four PhD students and will also teach two MTh modules (or BA Hons. modules) at HTC. We are delighted to welcome them to the team!

The sponsor money raised will be divided between the **Dumisani Theological Institute & Bible School** in King William's town, South Africa, where our former HTC colleague Professor Alistair Wilson is the Principal, and **Zomba Theological College** in Malawi, where Dr Bruce Ritchie, Minister in Castle Street Church of Scotland, Dingwall, used to teach.



Dumisani Theological Institute and Bible School, based in King William's town, South Africa, provides theological education and training for the churches of the Eastern Cape of South Africa. It is the only institution providing this type of study at degree level within a radius of approximately 300km. Dumisani represents the interests of various churches, including the Free Church in Southern Africa and the Free Church of Scotland.

The Institute began in 1979, when its main emphasis was lay training and the provision of basic literature in English and Xhosa. It now offers diploma and degree level courses. Currently there are some 57 enthusiastic students (21 full-time and 36 part-time) studying mainly at degree level, 3 full-time academic staff and 4 administrative staff.



Zomba Theological College in Malawi

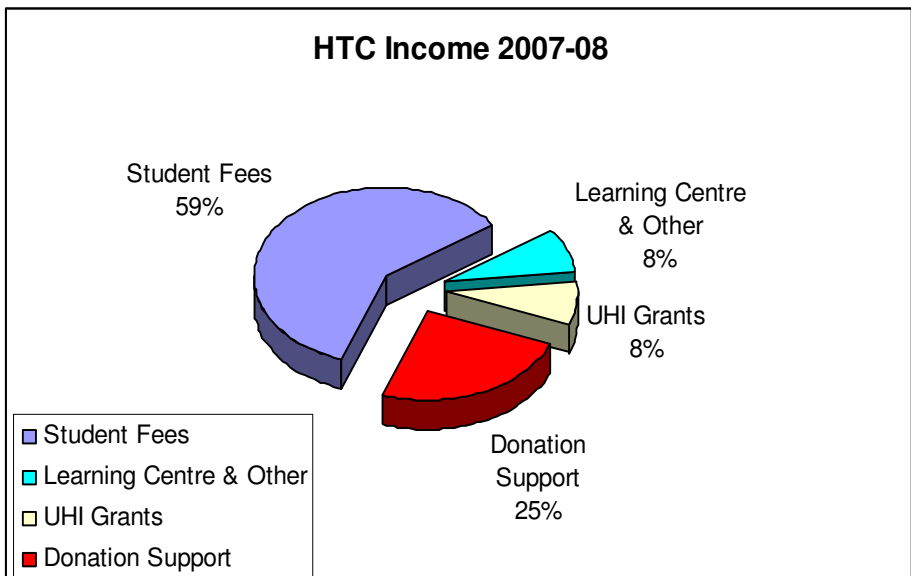
Malawi, described as 'the warm heart of Africa' because of the friendliness of its people, has a population of approximately 12 million, with about 90% living in villages in the Bush. Poverty, famine, illiteracy and HIV/AIDS affect a large percentage of the population. Christianity came to Malawi in the 1880s when a group of Scottish Presbyterians set up a mission on the shores of Lake Malawi. Zomba is the former capital of the country and seat of government (Lilongwe is now the capital). Zomba Theological College was founded in 1977. The church is growing in Malawi but faces many challenges, most notably the adherence of so many Christians to traditional tribal customs that often conflict with various church doctrines. This presents a real challenge to the teaching and understanding of Christianity in Africa.



Where our funding comes from in 2007-08

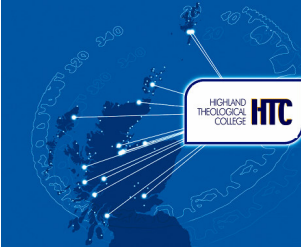
HTC is heading for another big intake of undergraduate students. This is great news for our overall funding for the coming session, as this will be nearly 60% of our income. Around half of our student fee income will come from bursary and self-funded students such as Access, Open Learning and International students. The other half will come direct from the Student Awards Agency Scotland (SAAS) and via UHI from the Scottish Funding Council (SFC).

However, it will take much more than these student fees to keep the College living and growing. UHI Grants for academic operations and developments will contribute a further 8%, as will the Learning Centre and other smaller income streams.



This year, we again need 25% of our income to come from all those faithful folks who support us so well by their donations. In the past year to July, you gave generously over £150,000. Without that kind of support, HTC simply could not continue. Our auditors tell us so every year! We are, in a very real way, dependent on God for His provision for this work, through His people. We hope that you will be greatly encouraged by the blessing and fruit the work of the college is experiencing and will join with us through your giving and your prayer.

HTC Delivers Classes to Scottish Colleges



Not everyone is able to move to Dingwall for one to four years to study the BA in Theological Studies. Another option is to study the BA by Open learning from home. This, however, doesn't suit everyone either, so HTC makes the BA available through colleges across the Highlands and beyond.

Students studying by the 'remote' method are treated as full or part time students in the same way as those in Dingwall. Thanks to a grant from UHI, all of HTC's classrooms are equipped with interactive whiteboards, computers and video conference facilities. Students at remote sites are able to take part in classes in the same way as those on-site. They see the same notes, take part in class discussions and watch their lecturer in the same way as those at HTC. When the class is over they can continue to interact with their fellow students with the online discussion boards and student community. There are also opportunities for 'remote' students to come to HTC for a day, a week or one of our 'teaching weekends', so that they can actually experience life at the college and meet their fellow students and lecturers face to face. Even where this is not convenient, host colleges provide very similar student facilities to those offered by HTC.

Colleges where you can study the BA by Video Conference are: Argyll College, Inverness College, Lews Castle College, Lochaber College, Moray College, North Highland College, Orkney College, Perth College, Sabhal Mòr Ostaig and Shetland College. Perth College is particularly useful as it opens up the option of studying at HTC to many people in central Scotland as commuting from the central belt is easy.

MTh in Reformed Theology

This taught MTh is intended to provide students who already have a degree in theology with an opportunity to study Reformed Theology to a deeper and greater extent than is possible at undergraduate level. It will particularly attract those with an interest in the rise and development of the Calvinistic tradition. It begins in October and students will complete a number of modules before writing a dissertation. Each module will be taught in an intensive one-week block in Dingwall.

Modules will include the following: History of Reformed Theology (Dr Gerald Bray); Scottish Covenant Theology (Professor ATB McGowan); Calvin & Calvinism (Professor Paul Helm); and Zwingli and the Swiss Reformation (Dr Nick Needham).

Charitable Status in USA

HTC is a designated Scottish charity and UK taxpayers can contribute to the College using the Gift Aid scheme. We are delighted to announce that HTC now has charitable status in the USA, so that tax payers in the USA can also make tax deductible donations to HTC.

In order to achieve this, it was necessary to create a charitable foundation in the USA. This foundation, a 501(c)(3) in the official jargon, is called 'Friends of Highland Theological College, Inc.' and is registered in the State of Georgia. We are hugely indebted to a lawyer friend in Atlanta, Kirk Susong, who has put in a tremendous amount of work to create this foundation and then to have it recognised by the Internal Revenue Service. We are delighted that he has not only created the Foundation but has agreed to chair the Board of Trustees.

The inaugural Trustees of the Foundation are Kirk Susong, L. Roy Taylor, Lewis Bell, Allen Curry and Andrew McGowan. Roy Taylor is the Stated Clerk of the Presbyterian Church in America, Lewis Bell is a lawyer in Jackson, Mississippi and Allen Curry is a Professor at Reformed Theological Seminary.
